

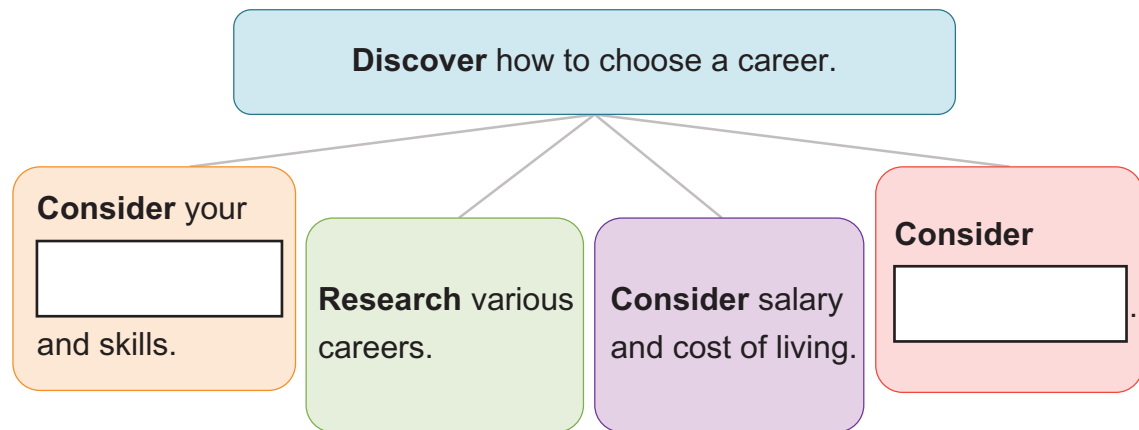

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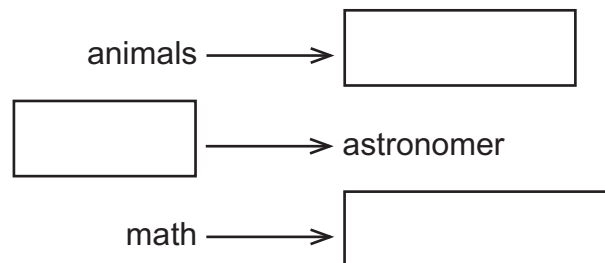
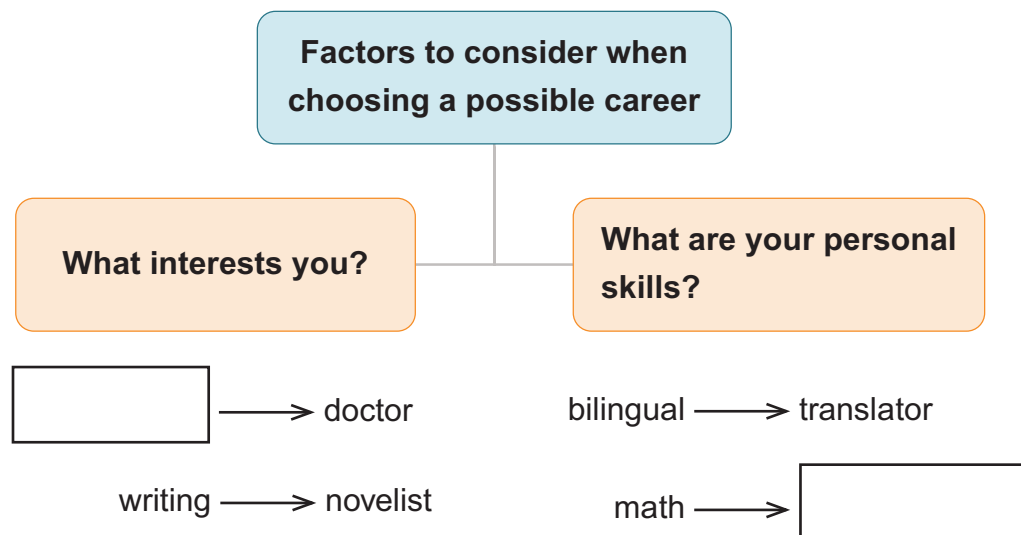
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Planning for a Career

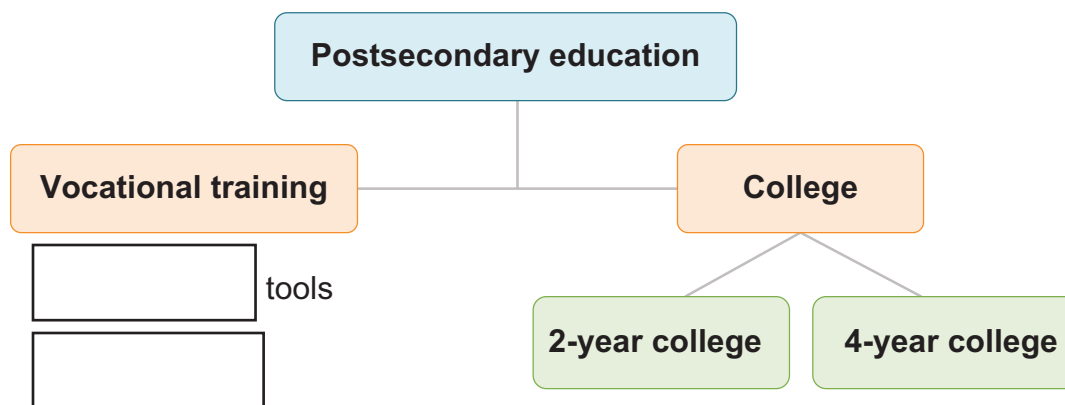
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Preparing for a Career

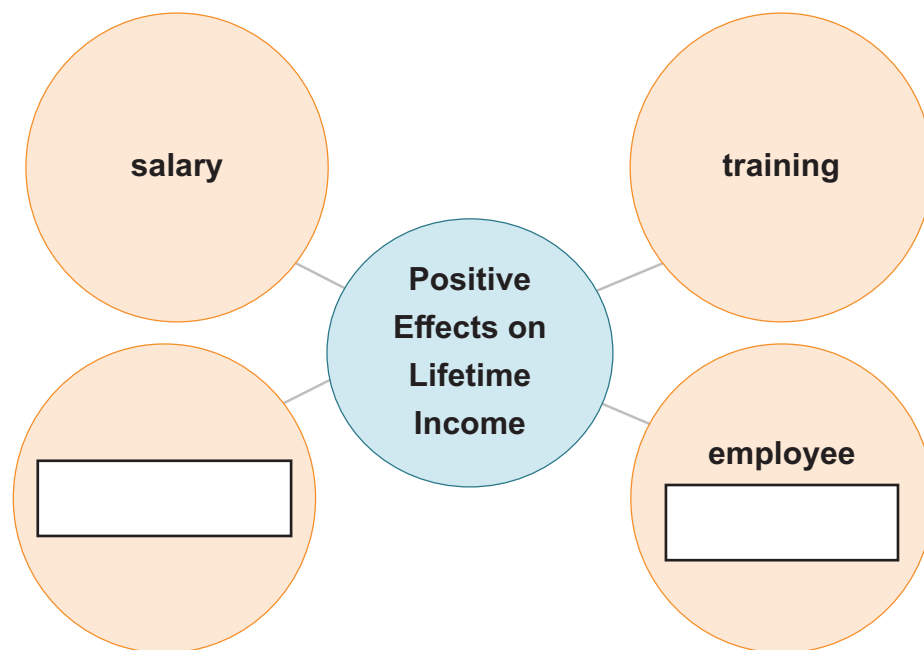
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Lifetime Income
